Sheep deaths caused by bacteria, virus and over-eating

The identification of three possible reasons for the recent death of large number of sheep in Miryalguda by the State Veterinary Biological and Research Institute, Hyderabad, raises bigger questions of the vulnerability of the sheep population that are taken for grazing in the open fields across the State.

Random samples of serum, blood and viscera from affected flocks tested positive for Peste des petits ruminants (Sheep plague or PRR), Enterotoxemia (ET or Overeating disease) and Leptospirosis, District Animal Husbandry Officer (AHO) C.H. Ramesh said.

Not only are the nomadic shepherds lacking awareness of the diseases, but also the affected animals have not been vaccinated by the administration of the originating district, veterinarians pointed out. In ET or overeating disease, a change in animal's diet with high fibre and protein intake accelerates the already 'low bacteria' present in its intestines into bacteria toxins.

There is a higher risk of the animals suffering from ET in the coming days as the sheep are likely to overeat in harvested paddy fields starting April. Thankfully, ET is a vaccine-curable disease unlike PRR. "And all veterinary departments have enough supplies of ET vaccines," officials said.

- In the programme, a door to door examination of animals was conducted by the experts from SKUAST-K and the ailing animals were treated on spot.
- According to Head and Programme Coordinator, KVK-Ganderbal, Dr Javid Ahmad Bhat, a number of calls were received from the farmers of the area complaining of death and sickness of milch animals.
- Acting on the complaints, a team of experts was deputed to the area for managing the disease.
- Subject Matter Specialist (Animal Science), KVK-Ganderbal, Dr Parvaiz Ahmed Reshi
 confirmed that the majority of animals in Repora, Waliwar, Chanthan, Gulabpora,
 Chontwaliwar and adjoining villages of the area were affected by the disease and some
 mortalities of the young animals, along with worsening of condition of the adult animals,
 have been reported.
- Talking to Greater Kashmir, Director animal husbandry, Kashmir, Dr M Y Chaproo said that
 they have already carried vaccination programme of cattle in all the areas. "We will ask
 the concerned official to visit the areas again to assess the situation and vaccinate the
 affected cattle," he added.

Foot and mouth disease breaks out in north Kashmir, authorities in slumber

Baramulla: Foot and Mouth disease which broke out in many villages of north Kashmir has led to the death of many animals from past one month while hundreds other have fallen sick.

Locals of Uri, Boniyar, Narvaw, Tangmarg, Kandi in Baramulla, Mawar, Langate, Handwara, Lolab and others in Kupwara districts said that due to the disease break out farmers lost large number of animals including cow, goat and sheep, while others hundreds are sick.

However local complained that concerned department of animal and sheep husbandry has failed to curb the disease in the area.

A group of farmers of Handwara said that large number of their livestock died in Bungus valley due to the foot and mouth disease.

Pig diseases grip Mizoram: 3168 die in outbreak; more than 7000 taken ill

AIZAWL, August 1, 2018: As disease outbreak looms over the piggery sector of the state, it was reported that at least 3,168 pigs have died in Mizoram because of the outbreak of the porcine reproductive and respiratory syndrome (PRRS) and classical swine fever (CSF) since March this year.

State animal husbandry and veterinary deputy director Dr K. Lalrohlua (disease investigation) told **The Telegraph** that the figures were collected from all the eight districts of the state.

According to the records available with the department till July 28, 3,168 pigs and piglets have died due to PRRS and CSF and a majority of them were piglets, he said.

He said around 7,138 pigs and piglets have been taken ill till date due to the outbreak of PRRS and CSF.

According to Lalrohlua, the first case of PRRS was identified from Zokhawthar village on Mizoram-Myanmar border on March 17 and that of CSF was detected on April 13. He said the two diseases have affected the entire state and at least 105 villages in all the eight districts were affected.

Of the 620 blood samples tested during March to July, 349 pigs were found infected with PRRS, while 277 others tested positive for CSF, he added.

Although the outbreak is not fully controlled, it has waned, he said.

According to Lalrohlua, Aizawl district was the hardest hit with 1,923 pig deaths, followed by Serchhip district with 456 deaths.


Altogether 363 pigs and piglets died in Lawngtlai district, 174 in Champhai district, 158 in Siaha district, 71 in Kolasib district, 12 in Lunglei district and 11 in Mamit district.

According to the deputy director, the state government is making massive efforts to curb the outbreak.

He said the government has banned import of pigs from neighbouring states and countries and also prohibited inter-village movement of pigs. All pig farmers were also instructed to cull their ailing pigs and also bury the carcasses deep underground, he added.

Lalrohlua said the PRRS outbreak was somehow prevented in some districts due to the administration of CSF vaccine although there is no appropriate vaccine for PRRS.

The first phase of mass CSF vaccination will be launched in all parts of the state from August to October to prevent further outbreak he added.



Six suspected anthrax cases in Anantapur district

ANANTAPUR: About half a dozen people have been admitted to government general hospital in Anantapur and other hospitals since Tuesday complaining of anthrax symptoms and are undergoing treatment. However, hospital authorities refused to confirm those cases as Anthrax, Anthrax is a zoonotic disease caused by consumption of meat from an animal infected with Anthrax

bacteria. On Tuesday, three people - a couple in their thirties and a 63year-old woman - from Chetla Morampalli village in Gorantla mandal got admitted to the hospital complaining of symptoms akin to Anthrax.



They said they developed stomach and body pains after consuming the meat of dead animals in the village. When animal the husbandry officials department enquired, they found that around 80 sheep had died due to Anthrax. As several seasonal diseases prevalent in the district for the past couple of months, doctors are yet to confirm if the trio were infected with anthrax or not.

Foot and mouth disease affects cattle in Balige village

Cattle in Balige village are infected with foot and mouth disease which has spread from the stray cattle in Kyatanamakki.

The cattle affected with the disease bleed from their gums and hooves. The aged cattle have become weak, after not being able to consume fodder. The disease is also found in Dantaga and Thura areas.

The cattle of the local breed of Malenadu Gidda, have also developed foot and mouth disease. The farmers see a bleak future as the bulls used for agriculture and milch cows are suffering from the disease.

Animal husbandry department officials and staff have visited Balige village and have noted the severeness of the disease. Department Assistant Director Dr Venugopal said that as the domestic cattle have come in contact with stray cows in Kyatanamakki while grazing, the disease has spread faster. Hundreds of stray cattle from other regions which graze in the hills are not vaccinated against the disease.

The villagers said that the cattle from other places are transported in goods vehicles, and are left in the hills to graze.

Aizawl: At least 35 pigs and piglets have died of classical swine fever in Mizoram-Myanmar border village of Biate in Champhai district since July. State Animal Husbandry and Veterinary department director Dr Saingura Sailo said, laboratory tests have confirmed that the pigs died of classical swine fever and not Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome (PRRS). The laboratory tests were conducted at the College of Veterinary Science and Animal Husbandry at Selesih near Aizawl, he said.
